

In his most recent assignment, LTC Redding served as the Brigade Deputy commander for the 128th AVN Brigade at Joint Base Langley Eustis in VA. LTC Redding has deployed to Afghanistan three times in support of Operation





Enduring Freedom and Operation Freedom Sentinel and Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. LTC Redding is a graduate of the Aviation Basic Course, Initial Entry Rotary Wing Course, the Aviation Officers Advanced Course, United States Army Command and General Staff College, Defense Language Institute (Mandarin Chinese), and Joint Professional Military Education. He is Joint Fires and Combatives instructor and Joint Missile Defense certified. He is qualified in UH-60A/L, UH-60M, and UH-1 helicopters. He also holds a Master of Science degree in Leadership from Embry Riddle Aeronautical University.

LTC Redding's significant military awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal, and Joint Service Achievement Medal. He has earned the Expert Infantryman, Senior Aviator, and Air Assault Badges. LTC Redding has been married to the former Dana Thomas of Downingtown, PA, for 27 years. They have two sons: Willis (15) and Mark (11).

## What class/classes are utilizing these SMART Tables? How are students using them?

The classes using the SMART table are my environmental and AP environmental science classes. The table is just a trial until we learn all the ins and outs of computer programming. We are growing lettuce and watering the plants normally.

## How does this opportunity to work with both plant sciences and computer science/automation/robotics help these students and improve the overall academic experience Hargrave provides?

Currently, we are not offering any computer science classes, so it is exciting to provide that opportunity for my science classes in future experiments. The opportunity for students to work with plant sciences and computer science/automation/robotics at Hargrave improves their overall academic experience. By combining these fields, students gain a multidisciplinary understanding and develop practical skills that can be applied in various industries.

## The tables have only been at Hargrave about a month so far, but what has the learning been like for the students?

The students are intrigued by the process and are excited to see the time-lapse video of the lettuce growing.

#### Anything else that you want to add?

We are just excited to be able to join forces with the Institute to help all students learn about the different types of agriculture and to work on this project. I look forward to additional projects and experiments that we can do together in the future.






## APPROACH

## HOW GRANT COURT BECAME A REALITY

Nestled behind the centerfield fence of the Fuller baseball field, a new facility has been added to the campus, embodying the spirit of teamwork and community. It all started with a simple request. The Corps of Cadets had a vision—a multi-purpose court where they could play games outdoors during free time. The Hargrave Parent Association became the catalyst, willing to turn this vision into concrete reality.

Last year's Parents Weekend became more than just a series of heartwarming reunions and athletic competitions; it was the starting point of a transformative fundraising effort. With bake sales, silent auctions, and even a mini-carnival, the Parent Association went beyond just raising money; they captured the essence of what this court would symbolize—a community coming together for the benefit of its cadets. To bring this ambitious project to fruition, the E. Stuart James Grant Charitable Trust, a long-time Hargrave supporter, stepped in to cover the remaining half of the costs.


The end result is a sprawling 50' X 100' court, flexible and expansive, accommodating a wide array of sporting activities. Whether you're perfecting your three-pointers on one of its two basketball goals, challenging your friend to a Pickleball match, settling the score in Foursquare, or mastering Futsal skills, Grant Court is the place to be.

Since its completion, Grant Court has become a steady presence in daily cadet life. On any given day, the court is a hive of activity, a physical manifestation of what our school is all about: dedication, camaraderie, and mutual respect. Cadets don't just come here to play; they come here to foster bonds, to take a break from their demanding schedules, and to grow as individuals.

The story of Grant Court is not merely one of fundraising and concrete; it's a narrative of a community that listens to its youth, understands their needs, and takes collective action to fulfill them. For every slam dunk, every Pickleball rally, and every victorious whoop heard on this court, there is an underlying melody—a song of gratitude and unity that echoes around the campus. So, the next time you step on campus, stop by Grant Court and take a moment to appreciate not just the games played there, but also the incredible journey of collaboration and support that has made it possible.







# CADETS TEST THE WATERS

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, for every child under age 18 who dies from drowning, another 7 receive emergency department care for nonfatal drowning. Nearly 80% of people who die from drowning are male. Many factors might contribute to higher rates of drowning among males, including increased exposure to water, risk-taking behaviors, and alcohol use. Over half of fatal and nonfatal drownings among people 15 years and older occur in natural waters like lakes, rivers, or oceans. In the United States, over a 10-year period, there was an average of 11 fatal unintentional drownings per day and an average of 22 nonfatal drownings per day.

With these sobering statistics in mind, Hargrave has implemented a "swim test to graduate" to ensure every junior and senior cadet has demonstrated the minimum skills and knowledge needed to be safe in and around water sources. They will be able to recognize and safely handle a water emergency such that they do not put themselves or others in further potential harm through an aquatics skills and safety training program.

Designed by Athletics and Aquatics Director Amanda Weishaar, the test consists of:

- Jumping into 16 feet of water and surface
- Tread water for 2 minutes
- Perform a 360 spin
- Float for 1 minute
- Swim 50 yards
- Exit without using a ladder

This is Hargrave's first year implementing this test. All seniors are required to take the test, while it is optional for the juniors, and they have three opportunities throughout the school year to attempt it. If they fail, they will receive 2 hours of instruction from Athletic Director Amanda Weishaar every





week for approximately 11-12 weeks if they are in a non-competitive sport. Alternatively, they have the option to join the swim team in the winter season. In addition, they have full access to the pool seven days a week in which to train.

When they pass, they are given extra instruction on some key water safety components, including:

- Lifejackets their usage; how to wear them correctly; jumping off the 1-meter and 3-meter diving boards; and how to float independently or as a group.
- Diving precautions and spinal injury

   dangers of diving into shallow
   water; and a demonstration from
   Hargrave lifeguards on how to strap
   someone onto a backboard if they
   dive into shallow water or perform
   high-risk actions off diving boards.
- Reach and Throw, Don't Go How to save someone without going into the water and becoming a victim themselves.
- Cold Water Exposure They watch a video on the dangers of entering cold water. The video is a study from the British Royal Navy that used Olympic swimmers to perform the tests.
- Dangers of pool drains and flash flooding
- Riptides how to spot one and how to survive one.

Upon completing both portions, the student will be awarded the "swim test ribbon" they can wear on their blouse. These ribbons will be awarded during the weekly chapel service.




























# A CORNERSTONE OF ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT



## A CADET WHO ROSE TO THE SPOTLIGHT




"In 2021, I started high school at my local Catholic school and had trouble adjusting to the new environment, mainly because of COVID-19. Each week would either be all in person or all on Zoom and I only really knew half of the school because those were the people I came in contact with. I struggled to make real friends, and my experience lacked natural substance. I would attend school every day, go through the motions in class, do the bare minimum in sports, and go home and play video games or sleep all day. For those who don't know me, this cycle is a recipe for disaster. I need some kind of long-term goal or higher purpose to strive to meet, and I just felt I wasn't getting that.

A few years before this, my mom had mentioned military school to me, not as a punishment, but as an environment where she thought I would do very well, and I agreed. So, I got my parents to search for possible

military schools for me to attend. As a resident of Pennsylvania, our natural first choice was the nearby Valley Forge Military Academy. My parents and I toured the school as a family and were impressed with the atmosphere, so we scheduled a day for me to shadow a cadet as he went through his day. While there, I noticed a need for more enthusiasm for the school. It seemed like everyone didn't want to be there, and there wasn't much care for the institution or even other cadets. This was not what I was looking for. My family and I thought we were out of luck until a former president of Valley Forge gave us some information. He recognized that I wanted to attend a military academy for the right reasons. He felt that Valley Forge wouldn't do me well as it has fallen into the category of reform school in recent years, and I might do better at a place like Hargrave.

In the summer after my Freshman year of high school, my father and I traveled eight hours from our home in Yardley, Pennsylvania, to see Hargrave for a day. Immediately, we were struck with the total investment the faculty and staff had made into the lives of each cadet. Even cadets who lived in the area who came to help with the open house seemed joyful and glad to be there, a welcome change from Valley Forge. As we toured the campus, I envisioned myself standing in formation on company street, having fun with other cadets in the game room, or making my bed so tightly that I could bounce a quarter off it. However, what stuck with me the most was when Mr. Sloan Gibson, Interim President at the time, pulled me and my father into his office and spoke to us. Still, I don't know why he did that, but I am incredibly grateful. Mr. Gibson asked me what I wanted out of life, and then he told me about some of his. He told me how he used to be a troublemaker and that he was only a wrong decision or two from being put in jail or worse. Then, he explained how Hargrave changed him. He showed me pictures of himself as a HMA and West Point cadet. My Father and I quickly concluded that if Hargrave could turn a rowdy young man into the cadet of the decade at West Point, it would be a good place for me. The following August, I shaved my head, headed down to the quartermaster, and waited several hours, like every cadet before me.

Over three years, I have held various leadership positions with very different duties and responsibilities. As a sophomore in my first year, I was chosen to be a squad leader, and I also stepped up for an extended period as the interim platoon sergeant when ours was dealing with family issues. The following year, I earned the rank of Command Sergeant Major, where I served in a much more administrative and managerial capacity than before. Finally, in my Senior year, I am the Bravo Company Commander, an unexpected and challenging appointment. It has been very jarring going from an environment where I managed hundreds of cadets at a high level with little intimacy. I am directly in charge of a small group of 35, whom



I am learning to treat more like people than a statistic. Even though it's hard, I am incredibly grateful for the challenges I've faced here. These different opportunities to lead and be led have been instrumental in forming who I am. Without Hargrave, I wouldn't be as mentally and morally strong as I am today.

Unfortunately, this year, I had to enroll without my dad there to support me. This past winter and summer, he had been home struggling to breathe. He had been fighting lung cancer for almost seven years and unfortunately contracted COVID last Christmas, which led to pneumonia and bronchitis. The following eight months for him was a cycle of fighting different respiratory illnesses, as well as struggling through chemotherapy and various other cancer treatments. My dad lost his battle with cancer on August 27th, 2023, surrounded by people whose lives he had directly affected positively. However, one of the most touching things to me was the support I received from Hargrave. Countless emails and calls came in from cadets and teachers. Our school's president, Mr. Peterson, even flew up for the day to attend my



Dad's funeral, as well as two of my baseball coaches and one cadet with whom I am very close. Without the support of the faculty and staff, as well as the cadets of Hargrave, I would be in a much more challenging position. I don't know what I would do if my dad hadn't taken me down that summer to tour campus. The decision has forever changed my life in ways that I wouldn't be able to imagine before."

## The Chosen: Guide and Inspire

Leadership School at Hargrave offers a rigorous and comprehensive foundation for honing essential leadership skills. cadets are immersed in an environment that emphasizes discipline, teamwork, and effective communication from the start. The benefits of attending are numerous, ranging from the development of strong decision-making abilities to fostering resilience in high-pressure situations.

The structured curriculum exposes cadets to a range of leadership styles and strategies, while also instilling a sense of responsibility and accountability.

Upon graduation from Leadership School, the selection of new Corps leaders is a pivotal moment where cadets demonstrate their newly acquired skills and are chosen to guide and inspire their fellow cadets in their future endeavors




#### Gloria Suarez, Sebastian's mother:


#### Chaplain Michael Washington


